Here's Kate's description of her introduction to truffle hunting:

What can I do to get my husband to walk for his health (desk job) and I get to play with my dog at the same time? Truffle hunting! For \$300/lb. even Tim will walk in the forest.

Last fall, Silly, Tim and I took a truffle hunting evaluation class through NW Truffle dogs. Silly got high scores in tenacity, low scores in timidity. Though we haven't yet done actual truffle hunting we are having a ball hiding "truffle discs" in the leaves and undergrowth and having Silly find them. Of all the activities I'm experimenting with, this is one that captures and keeps Silly's attention and enthusiasm.

Truffle training begins with some discs that are either neutral or "truffly" The dog is affirmed when they discover the truffle and ignored when they discover the neutral. In a matter of minutes Silly realized I wanted the smell not the disc. She was targeting the truffle disc about 70% of the time.

It was a fun activity through the winter truffle hunting indoors about 10 minutes in the evening. In the couch, under a rug, behind the curtain; short, sweet and very fun! (continued on page 3)



Directions From the South:

Take I-5 North to the Arlington/Darrington Exit (Hwy 530). Follow Hwy 530 through Arlington to Darrington (Approximately 30 miles). At the stop sign in Darrington make a left, following Hwy 530 toward Rockport. Just before Milepost 62, turn left onto Concrete-Sauk Valley Road. You will quickly cross the Sauk River and veer right. Follow the Concrete-Sauk Valley road about 6 miles. At approximately MP 12.1 there are two blue address markers on the left hand side (52368, 52372). Turn left and proceed 1 mile up the gravel road to the house

Directions From the North:

Take I-5 south to the Cook Road exit just north of Mt. Vernon. Follow Cook Road into Sedro Woolley and turn left on Hwy. 20. Follow Hwy 20 about 25 miles to Concrete. Just before Concrete you will go through the town of Grassmere where there is an Albert's Red Apple in a strip mall on the right. Continue about another 1/2 mile and turn right onto Concrete-Sauk Valley Road. (You will turn before actually reaching Concrete proper). There is a Valley's West Realty building at the turn. Proceed on Concrete-Sauk Valley until milepost 12.1 where there are two blue address markers on the right (52368, 52372). Turn right and proceed 1 mile up the gravel road to the houses.

FCRSA National Specialty 2014: Update

The Northwest Flat-coated Retriever Club will host the Flat-Coated Society of America's annual national specialty in Albany, Oregon next year. Members of the northwest club are working very hard to make our specialty the best it can be.

Co-chair Joyce Brackney sends this update:

"The event will be the first week of June in 2014 in Albany, Oregon at the

Linn Co. Fairgrounds. The schedule is printed in this newsletter. We

hope you will be able to attend. It is just so fun seeing all the flat-coats. Committee chairs met to coordinate work at the Albany shows in March, and the progress looks good. I want to thank everybody for their diligent work."

Here's a quick look at the details:

*Onofrio will be our superintendent for the specialty.

*Judges have been selected.

*We will use two logos and they are shown in this newsletter (page 10). One for silk screen and one for embroidery. There will be lots of great flat-coat merchandise to choose from.

*The trophies will probably be glass pieces and the ribbons are huge.

*We have great caterers. All the meals will be at the fairgrounds. A tentative menu has been chosen, but we can't lock in prices until the end of the year. Wine and beer tasting, along with great northwest food will highlight the meals.

*We are looking at options for the bags participants will receive, and also considering several options for table favors.

Joyce concludes her message by addressing funding. "Fund raising is very important so we can have enough money to hold the event. We have several fund raisers going right now. Please look at the flyers to see if you would want to purchase anything.

Every year we hold a NW FCRSA agility trial which is the big fund raiser for the specialty. It is July 25-28, 2013 in Medford, Oregon. Part of this fund raiser is a raffle. Quilt Raffle: Fundraiser for the 2014 Specialty



Meet Our Board Member: Pat Boydston

Meet Pat Boydston, our new board member at-large. Pat hails from Medford, Oregon, and has been active in our club for many years. As you'll read, she's been involved in conformation, agility, obedience, and agility.

Pat writes:

My first introduction to the Flat Coat world was with Joyce Brackney. I was teaching my Mom's Aussie mix agility and trialing with him. Joyce was training with me at Rogue Canine Agility club. I met Leo and Annie and fell in love with Leo. I loved his size and his personality. He was a very talented dog who did agility, obedience, hunt tests and tracking. Many titles! At the time i had a German Shorthair and Springer mix named Jasper who really had no desire to do Agility. He love was chasing birds, butterflies and swimming. I was recovering from female surgery and i had been off work for 8 weeks and just getting back to help out at agility class. I asked Joyce what the possibility was of getting a puppy from her someday, since i knew she had just had a litter of puppies that went to new homes recently. Joyce surprised me by saying that she had one puppy that she wasn't able to find a home for. This was from the Annie and Leo litter. This puppy was in her car while she was at class, so of course I had to hold him and I never let him go. His name was Shasta Sgt Murtaugh and he and I had a great time together. He earned many agility titles in Nadac, ASCA and AKC, but mostly he won my heart! He hated the conformation ring and the obedience ring. He would have gotten at least his Junior hunter title if I would have known about it sooner. He became the ambassador to all dogs and people when we went to agility trials. He left the ring many times to go visit old and new dog friends. Didn't matter what breed of dog he loved them all. When he was 4 I asked Joyce if she was going to do a repeat breeding and I was pleased to find out that she was doing a repeat breeding that year.

I got a phone call from Joyce saying that she was on her way to the vet's office with Annie for a C-section and would I come and help. I beat her to the vet's office and was there for the birth of that litter. I helped dry the puppies off and rubbed them to keep them breathing. I visited every weekend after they were born and had my eye on two of the puppies, one boy and one girl. I had a name all picked out for the puppy SGT Riggs and it could be a girl or boy. It all came down to him picking me everytime I visited. CH Shasta SGT Riggs MH came into our lives and Murtaugh loved his little brother. I continued running in agility trials with Murtaugh and started showing Riggs in conformation. I earned one point with him in conformation and soon learned that his body just needed to mature more before showing him again. I got some really good advice from Dinah and Rick to wait until he was 4 before bringing him back to the ring. So off he went to hunt training instead, which of course was the best thing for him. The trainer ran him twice in Junior tests and then I started running him. It took several tests before he earned his Junior title and I was hooked. I decided to continue training with our local retriever group to go onto Senior. He was now 4 and I took him up to Dinah and Rick to show. Thanks to Rick and Dinah, he got his majors and minor points to get his championship.

During the time that Riggs was showing, Murtaugh was diagnosed with Cancer. I was devastated and determined to do whatever I could to keep him with me. They removed his spleen and started Chemo. He was a great patient and didn't have any problems with the chemo. We went to his favorite beach and he had a great time. I was able to spend two more months with him before he made his journey over the rainbow bridge. I miss him dearly but know he is forever in my heart! After Riggs earned his Senior hunting title, I really wanted him to go on to Master. I did not have enough hunting knowledge to continue by myself. I had met Katie Quarles at a Hunt test at Sauvie Island and she had given me some great training advice when I was going through the senior tests. I contacted her to see about her training Riggs to Master. She had never trained a Flat Coat and really wanted to work with him. Thanks to Katie Riggs has his Master Hunting title. When I was at the Oregon National Specialty, I ran Riggs in the Master test and steady singles. We didn't qualify, but had a great time. I ran him in agility for the 1st time at the specialty and did Rally. Riggs is retired now and still loves to retrieve bumpers, but would rather have birds.

While we were at the Specialty I ran into Judy Teskey and mentioned that when Rip has puppies, that I would love to get a puppy from her. Well to my surprise Rip was pregnant! Judy added me to the list of buyers and I traveled to Canada with my sister and Carolyn Mc Knight to see the puppies when they were 5 weeks old. They were so cute and cuddly. When they were old enough to come home Carolyn, my sister and I went back to the Island to pick up our puppies. The theme for the litter was to have Rip somewhere in the registered name since the parents call names were both Rip! So, Coastalight Rippling Pebbles came into my life. She is awesome! We decided to attend the Canadian Specialty on the Island the year after they were born. Carolyn, Salomeja and I all traveled together to attend. I had so much fun and showed her in Conformation. I also entered her in the WC and she earned her 1st title. She had all her field training with Katie and Tom Quarles and earned her Junior and Senior titles. I am training her for Master and hope to trial by this fall. I started training her for agility about 1 1/2 ago and she now has her Open titles in Standard and Jumpers with weaves. She is so easy to train and loves agility. After she finished her Senior hunting title I started classes in showing in conformation so that I could be a better handler in the ring. I entered her in the Klamath Falls show and while there got great training from Dinah in the handling class that was offered after the show. The next day with a horrible migraine, Rick took Pebbles in the ring for me and earned her 1st Major. After that she earned minor points several times until we went to Portland. The first day she earned her 2nd major. The last show we went to was in Klamath Falls again and she earned the last two points that were needed for her championship. We have lots of possibilities for the future, rally, obedience, Master hunter, Master agility, tracking! The journey together is so much fun and whatever happens we will do it together!

Besides all the adventures that I have had with all of my dogs, it is the people and dogs that we have met that make is all worth while. I have so many friends because of my dogs and our activities and love to learn more and more. I am now a AKC Hunt test judge, Vice President of my agility club (past president & secretary), Vice President of my local Retriever club, past editor of the Flat Coat Times for the Northwest club. I am co-chair for the field events for the 2014 specialty and look forward to seeing everyone there.
