WC/WCX Test

Jennifer Stanley invites everyone to attend the WC/WCX Test on Saturday, October 6 at Greenleaf's property, in Monroe, Washington. Judges will be announced shortly.

This test is held annually. The NWFCRC shares responsibility for test with the Evergreen Golden Retriever Club, with the clubs alternating years of organizing and holding it.

In 1975, the FCRSA established the Working Certificate test (WC) primarily to encourage the use and maintenance of the natural working and retrieving abilities of the Flat-Coated Retriever and as a useful aid in the selection of breeding stock. The WC test is designed to test the natural abilities of the Flat-Coat including its memory, intelligence, attention, nose, marking ability, courage, perseverance, and style. New Diet Craze!




Lura Dunn and David Kerschner's Shasta's Western Samurai earned his championship at the Seattle show!


Judy Teskey reports on the event at Sauvie Island in Portland, Oregon:
